### **Background and Instructions**

#### Background

Section 10-d of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021, as amended by §5-b of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2022, requires school districts receiving a foundation aid increase of more than 10% or \$10,000,000 to create plans on how these funds will be used to address student performance and need. These plans are required in advance of the 2021-22, 2022-23, and 2023-24 school years. This is the final year that this requirement is in effect. Plans for the 2023-24 school year must be completed, submitted to the department, and posted to district websites by July 1, 2023.

Each district subject to this requirement is required to:

- Seek public comment from parents, teachers, and other stakeholders;
- Take public comments into account in the development of the plan;
- Include an analysis of public comments within the plan;
- Describe in the plan how the foundation aid increase will be used, including portions of the increase used to address the priority areas identified by law;
- · Post the plan on the district website; and
- Submit the plan to the State Education Department in a form prescribed by the Department to be posted publicly.

This requirement does not replace any requirements under Contracts for Excellence. If your district is required to submit a contract for excellence, more information is available at this page.

The list of school districts that are required to submit a plan aligned with the increase in foundation aid may be found in the "Foundation Aid Increase Notification Guidance" memo located in the Documents library at the lower left of the application. It should be noted that this requirement does not obligate districts to spend additional foundation aid funds in specific ways, but does require district seek public comment and share plans on how they intend to spend these additional funds. Plans are required to cover only the foundation aid increase. The plan should not cover how the district intends to use its entire foundation aid amount. - Districts must complete all sections and are required to answer questions marked with a red asterisk. If a required question has not been completed, the business portal will highlight it in red and the section of the application will be flagged. The district will be unable to submit the application to NYSED for final review if a required question remains unresolved.
- The online application may only be submitted/certified by the chief school officer of the district. The designated superintendent <u>or</u> the chief executive officer, or board of trustees president are the only administrators with the submit/certify rights necessary to successfully submit and certify a completed application for NYSED review.
- Districts are NOT REQUIRED to send hard copies of survey materials to the Department.

Pulaski Academy and Central Schools utilized the school's Leadership Team (comprised of administrators, Director of Special Programs, Director of Buildings & Grounds, Director of Technology, the Business Manager, and the Director of Data), the school's District Advisory Council (comprised of teachers, administrators, Union Executive Officers, paraprofessionals, Directors of Special Programs, and Department Chairs) to discuss use of Foundation Aid. Information was shared with the Leadership Team during weekly meetings throughout the 2022-2023 school year, and with the District Advisory Council during the February 28th DAC meeting. In addition, during the May 9th, 2023 Board of Education Meeting, information was presented to the community and posted on the school's website to share the purpose and use of Foundation Aid and elicit feedback from the community pertaining to priority areas to use Foundation Aid. The result of the meetings and discussions identified that PACS should focus on: providing adequate resources to ELL's, SWD, and students that experience homelessness; use aid to address and support student social and emotional health; provide additional supports to students that are at-risk of not meeting, or are failing, core courses and not meeting standards; reduce class sizes by providing more elective course offerings; increase school materials and resources support to all families; and focus on improving the school's graduation rate and closing academic achievement gaps. PACS was intentional about following state guidance on the use of Foundation Aid, and in applying a common sense approach that took into account stakeholders needs, and would yield the best results on academic programming and student success.

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
