A Message From the Pulaski Board of Education

These past few years have been filled with many unprecedented challenges for PACS. Through our shared commitment to keeping school open full time and the dedication of our staff, we were able to provide an extraordinary level of programming and opportunity to keep our students in school and engaged. We would like to sincerely thank our staff and the entire school community for their efforts.

During the 2022-23 budget development process, the PACS Board of Education was committed to devising a spending plan focused on efficiency and effectiveness in school operations, and opportunity, rigor, and sustainability in academic programming. The result is a budget that builds on quality programming for students and is responsive to economic variables that impact the District and community.

The proposed 2022-23 school budget totals \$28,919,000, which is a 3.5% increase over last year. If approved by voters, this budget would result in a tax levy increase of 2% or \$142,341, which is within the District's calculated tax levy limit this year.

A public hearing to present the 2022-23 budget will be held at 6:30 p.m., Tuesday, May 10, in the Pulaski Middle-High School Library. Voting will take place 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., Tuesday, May

17, at the Ringgold Fire Hall. The vote will include the 2022-23 budget, a proposition to withdraw \$167,000 from the bus purchase reserve, a proposition to create a new five-year bus purchase reserve in the amount of \$500,000, and the election of two members to the PACS Board of Education.

The budget also includes \$100,000 to be used toward a capital outlay project. The New York State Education Department allows for schools to complete capital improvement projects of up to \$100,000 during the proposed budget year. Building aid revenue is then received the following year (PACS state aid rate is 94%). The 2022-23 project will replace two circulating pumps on boilers at Pulaski Middle-High School.

PACS has a tradition of sound financial planning and budget development. The Board of Education and administrative team will continue to be strategic with our resources to provide opportunities and programs for students of which we can all be proud.



PROPOSITIONS

2022-2023 Budget

Shall the Board of Education of the Pulaski Central School District No. 1 of the Towns of Richland, Albion and Sandy Creek, Oswego County, New York be authorized to expend a sum not exceeding \$28,919,000 commencing July 1, 2022 and ending on June 30, 2023, and to levy the necessary tax on the taxable property of said District?

2017 Bus Reserve Withdrawal

Shall the Board of Education of the Pulaski Central School District No. 1 of the Towns of Richland, Albion and Sandy Creek, Oswego County, New York be authorized to expend a sum not exceeding \$167,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary from the 2017 Bus Purchase Reserve Fund for the purchase of transportation vehicles?

2022 Bus Reserve Fund

Shall the Board of Education of the Pulaski Central School District No. 1 of the Towns of Richland, Albion and Sandy Creek, Oswego County, New York (the "District") be authorized to establish a new capital reserve fund pursuant to Section 3651 of the New York Education Law, to be known as the "2022 Bus Purchase Reserve Fund," to pay the costs of school vehicles, in an ultimate amount of \$500,00 dollars (plus interest earned thereon), having a probable term of five (5) years and be authorized to raise \$500,000 to fund such capital reserve fund in the current or future years through various sources including, but not limited to, state aid reimbursement, cost saving measures resulting in unexpended funds or unappropriated fund balance and other legally available funds of the District?

Board Members - Two Seats

Please vote for two candidates for the available board of education seats.

WHO CAN VOTE?

According to New York Education Law, in order to vote, you must be:

- A citizen of the United States
- **≪** 18 years of age
- A resident of the district for at least 30 days

You do NOT have to be registered to vote.

You do NOT have to own property in the district, but you MUST reside in the district.

Identification and proof of residence WILL be requested at the time of voting.
